

For those waiting for answered prayer:


Grant Your steadfast patience.

A New Tree and Chrismons!

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Chrismons are symbols or monograms of our Lord and our God. We first had a Chrismon tree in 1972 when Burma Smith was president of the Women of the Church. One of our members came back from Massanetta with a Chrismon she had made in a workshop there. Our women decided to make Chrismons for a tree in our sanctuary. Burma's daughter Teresa Roberts agreed to host workshops in her home. The first Chrismons were made of Styrofoam and glitter and decorated a fresh cedar tree cut from Burma's yard. Since the Styrofoam ornaments proved not to be very durable, the women decided to make the beautiful felt, beading, and pearl ornaments that have decorated our Chrismon tree for many years. Of the group that worked on these museum quality ornaments, only three are still with us-Burma, Teresa, and Barbara Bond.

When Mike Taylor passed away last year, the family donated a 12-foot Balsam Hill tree to the church. It is taller than the tree we have used for years; clearly more ornaments were needed. Jerry Freeman has led the Cheerful Chrismon Crafters in making new ornaments for the larger tree. We have met every other Sunday since June and worked together crafting new ornaments. The group includes Jerry Freeman, Linda Audet, Alice Butler, Norma Halterman, Mary Leming, Carrie Norfleet, and Pat Sparks.

The colors of the Chrismons are white, symbolizing the purity and perfection of our Lord; gold, symbolizing our Lord's majesty; and a touch of red, to remind us of the blood of Christ, by which we are saved. May these symbols remind us of this holy season of God's greatest gift to all, Jesus Christ.
